<b>Type of work to expect and learning opportunities</b>	<p><b><u>On CDU:</u></b> CDU has a very high turnover, and usually you will only see each patient once and by the next day they will either have gone home or been moved to a medical ward. Your role is to go with the acute medical consultant and post-take all of the patients who are on CDU and who need to be seen. Then you do the jobs for those patients for the rest of the day. You'll see a lot of different pathology and the variety is very good, and each consultant has their own style and you will quickly become familiar with the acute management of a variety of different acute medical problems. If you have time you can also join the on call team to clerk new patients in A&amp;E. The ward is busy and you will meet many of the GP trainees, core medical trainees and registrars as they rotate through their on call blocks which means you will get to know a lot of medics from other teams and learn to work well with them.</p> <p><b><u>On CCU:</u></b> You will be the main ward doctor and partake in ward round every morning and then spend the day doing the jobs. The ward is split between primary PCIs and the elective side where elective patients will be returning after their procedures e.g. elective PCIs, ablations, pacemaker insertions. The elective patients will need routine checks post procedure and then if everything is normal, then you'll need to do their discharge summaries to go</p>

	<p>home.</p> <p>You will learn how to deal with acutely unwell cardiac patients as the common problems include: tachycardia, bradycardia, atrial fibrillation and heart failure. You will rapidly become familiar with cardiac medications and post MI management.</p>

<b>Type of work to expect and learning opportunities</b>	The job is a supernumerary job, yet this does not mean the F1 is not an important part of the team. Being the only doctor that works Monday to Friday on the unit, the F1 is usually the one that knows most of the patients best. There are 3 ward rounds a day (2 ITU rounds and one microbiology round) in which you are expected to present patients and help design management plans. Once the morning ward round is over, patients are divided amongst the doctors and you are to look after your own patients. This may include ordering investigations, managing changes in patients (such as them becoming hypotensive) and referring to other specialities. If patients leave ITU you are expected to complete a brief discharge summary. You will also get plenty of exposure to practical things like insertion of central lines and arterial lines.

Opportunity to get a good grounding in general medicine and general medical procedures (LP, chest drains, ABG's) as well as Insulin/diabetic medication and doses + changing from different diabetic regimes, etc. Covering three consultants (2 endo and one rheum – all very nice and helpful) one of whom is on-call, and taking all new admissions, every Wednesday and most weekends (either fri or sat+sun) so patient load can be high. The team was lacking a registrar for much of the time I was there and so was very busy with often very long hours (sometimes well past regular working hours) but I am lead to believe that this is not necessarily the case if the full team is available. I found it a good job to begin F1 with and have learnt a lot. However, the hours were very long on occasion.</p>

<b>Main duties of the placement</b>	Job description/duties: The working day starts at 9 am in the psychiatry liaison office located in the CDU department where the night team hands over to the day team. Typically there are two mental health nurses and a psychiatrist/trainee on site. Co-ordinating office will inform the day team of patients that are yet to be seen. Patients will be assessed by an experienced mental health worker accompanied by the F1 doctor. Initially the F1 will observe and as he/she develops competencies in taking a psychiatric history he/she will be able to

	<p>lead the interview while observed by experienced mental health worker. The F1 is not meant to see patients by his/herself. The job of psychiatry liaison services is to advise the medical/surgical team of the management of the mental health condition that the patient is experiencing while in hospital. The patient remains under the care of the admitting medical/surgical team. The mental health team keeps their own electronic records of patients. If the patient is already known to mental health services the appropriate service (social services, community mental health team, crisis team) will be informed of the admission. A plan is then formulated on the further management of the patient from a mental health point of view.</p>

This includes reviewing previous mental health records and the consultation itself. There are no formal ward round. Note writing is done electronically, as mentioned previously, and takes a further 30-45 min as many assessments need to be documented, including a risk assessment.
